Then she was elected to the Moon Township Board of Supervisors and served seven years from 1996 to 2002, two of those years she served as chairman. Doris and her husband were members of Montour Heights Country Club for 50 years and life members of Coraopolis Presbyterian Church. Doris was a perfect example of a hard-working, loving, caring, dedicated, and honest member of her community. She was loved and appreciated by her family.
