- born in Stolberg, Westphalia (Germany today)
- came to America in 1892 and had 7 children
- was a glass worker in Ford City, Pa
- died in 1920 at age of 78
- Gertrude's paternal grandfather

Mr. Kreutz was a native of Germany and came from Stolberg in the Rhineland, to Ford City 33 years ago and was employed for many years at the plant of the Pittsburg Plate Glass Company. He was a cheerful, likable disposition and made many warm friends who mourn his death. He was a constant member of St. Mary's church.

*** "Kreutz" is a German surname. It was very common for names to be spelled differently when people traveled to America, such as "Krentz". This word has several different meanings: cross, crucifix; sharp dagger; or small of the back.
